

Summer comfort in Southeastern Pennsylvania is rarely about temperature alone. SEER2 (Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio 2) — the current federal measurement for cooling efficiency — tells buyers how efficiently an air conditioner operates over a season, but it does not guarantee comfort if airflow or refrigerant charge is wrong. **CFM (cubic feet per minute)** — the volume of air moving through the system — matters just as much. Low CFM can turn a technically operational unit into a comfort problem that keeps getting worse. A malfunctioning **TXV valve (thermostatic expansion valve)** can meter refrigerant improperly, causing poor superheat control and erratic cooling behavior.

These are not cosmetic problems. They affect humidity removal, room-by-room balance, and utility bills. According to ASHRAE Standard 62.2, residential ventilation and indoor air quality are inseparable from comfort. If an AC system is short-cycling, running with clogged filtration, or paired with leaky ductwork, it may also circulate more dust, allergens, and VOCs than homeowners realize.
