- **The Play:** Buy secrets and open every new case that drops.
- **Why:** Pure home entertainment. Mathematically, opening cases is akin to playing a lottery with a heavily manipulated house edge. While striking an uncommon knife or hidden skin yields an enormous dopamine hit (and monetary return), the large majority of openings lead to low-tier, low-value weapon finishes.
