From direct product documentation and user feedback, **Grok is currently available only through Suprmind's platform**. Multi-Model Orchestration vs Model Switching

Decision Validation and Risk Registers

- **Perplexity Model Council:** Requires manual collation across model outputs. Risk registers often must be built externally by teams due to disparate source models.

2. **Perplexity:** Provides raw text exports from individual models. Citations exist but are less seamlessly integrated into final outputs.

Perplexity's Model Council, while flexible, lacks these refined workflow automations, demanding more hands-on toggling between models.
