Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Fixing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is an easy repair, but a loose hinge needs a bit more attention.

1. **Find the problem:** Open and close the door slowly to determine the troublesome hinge.
2. **Tighten screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have become removed, remove the screws, insert a little wood sliver (or a toothpick covered in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Lubricate:** If the door squeaks, use a few drops of light-weight device oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Wipe away any excess.

2. Changing a Sticking Door

If a door rubs versus the frame when closing, it is generally due to the fact that the leading hinge is loose, causing the door to droop, or the wood has broadened.

1. **Examine the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the leading and middle hinges.
2. **Utilize the longer screw trick:** If tightening doesn't work, change one brief screw on the frame side of the top hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the entire door assembly back into alignment.
3. **Aircraft the edge:** If the door still sticks after adjusting the hinges, utilize a block aircraft or a sander to shave down a tiny fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect outside doors annually for fractures, tears, or compression. Change worn strips to preserve home energy performance.

- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Since wood expands and contracts with moisture, maintaining a stable indoor humidity level using cooling or dehumidifiers assists prevent wooden doors from contorting and sticking.

You can often fix this by loosening the screws on the strike plate and moving it a little up or down, or by filing down the within lip of the strike plate opening.
