2. For Exchanging a Foreign License

If an applicant currently holds a license from an EU/EEA nation, it is usually recognized up until it ends, though it can be willingly exchanged for a Polish one.

For non-EU/EEA license holders (e.g., USA, India, UK post-Brexit, Ukraine), the guidelines are more stringent:

- Licenses from nations that signed the **1968 Vienna Convention on Road Traffic** can normally be exchanged straight, though tests might be required depending upon bilateral agreements and residency duration.
- Licenses from nations under the **1949 Geneva Convention** generally need passing the theoretical state test.
