- **Implementation Skins:** Changes the appearance of storage boxes, sleeping bags, heating systems, and doors.
- **Workshop Skins:** Community-created styles submitted for neighborhood and developer approval.

The Rust Skin Economy: How It Works

Unlike lots of video games where cosmetic microtransactions are strictly bound to an in-game store with fixed prices, *Rust* runs on a dynamic, player-driven economy.

Skins enter the game mostly through the **Steam Community Market** and the main weekly **Rust Item Store**. Facepunch launches a curated batch of new skins every Thursday. As soon as these official shop sales end, those items end up being tradeable and marketable strictly through peer-to-peer transactions on Steam.

Market forces determine the prices of these digital goods. Factors affecting a skin's value include:

- **Supply and Demand:** How lots of units were sold throughout their initial run versus how many active players want them.
- **Visual Appeal and Utility:** Highly detailed items or those including special camouflage often command higher prices.

- **Youtuber/Streamer Influence:** When a prominent *Rust* content creator utilizes a specific skin, need for that item often increases.
