

San Diego has a way of making practical decisions feel a little more aspirational. A new patio, a shaded outdoor room, or a well-built backyard deck is never just about lumber and fasteners here. Someone near the coast may focus on corrosion-resistant hardware and finishes that hold up against salty air. A family that uses the deck daily may care most about splinter resistance, surface temperature, and easy cleaning.
