

A freshly detailed car has a way of resetting your standards. The paint looks deeper, the reflections are sharper, and even a daily driver can suddenly feel special again. Then, after a few washes, the story changes. Under bright sun or a gas station canopy, faint circular marks start to show across the hood and doors. They are usually not deep scratches. They are swirl marks, and once you know what to look for, you see them everywhere.
