- **Case Opening:** Simulates the in-game case opening experience however frequently with considerably much better (or at least transparently specified) chances than the official Valve cases.

- **Lack of Consumer Protection:** If a website shuts down or refuses to pay out profits, users have little to no legal recourse.
- **Provably Fair Algorithms:** Reputable sites use cryptographic "provably fair" systems, permitting users to confirm that video game results are really random and not controlled by the home. Unregulated sites, however, might rig video games.
- **Underage Gambling:** Due to the casual integration with Steam-- a platform used by millions of minors-- enforcing strict age confirmation has actually traditionally been an obstacle for third-party operators.
