

In short, **horse feed** typically lasts for about 2 to 6 weeks after opening, but the actual **shelf life** depends on the feed type, the **expiration date**, and your **storage conditions**. If the **opened bag** is kept in **cool dry storage** with good **moisture control**, feed quality lasts longer and the risk of spoilage drops.
