Red The highest standard tier discovered in weapon cases, highly sought after. **Exceptionally Rare** Gold Special products like Knives and Gloves (Gloves were introduced later on).

The Float Value System

Aside from rarity, every skin is assigned a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00. This float dictates the wear condition of the weapon. Even 2 identical skins may look considerably various depending on their float value, which directly affects their market value.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, no scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor imperfections or scratches)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear on paint)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily degraded, in some cases modifies the look totally)

2. The Mechanics of Acquisition: How Players Get Skins

Players have a couple of unique techniques for constructing their digital inventories. Some count on large luck, while others choose direct acquiring.

- **Random Drops:** Simply playing on authorities or neighborhood servers grants weekly care plans consisting of weapon drops or graffiti.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can acquire or earn weapon cases and utilize a matching "Key" to open them. This runs likewise to a lotto, with low chances of unpacking high-tier items.

4. **StatTrak™ Technology:** Certain weapon drops come with an unique orange digital counter constructed into the body that tracks the variety of kills made with that particular weapon, adding a premium to the cost.

4. Iconic Skins That Defined the Culture

Over a decade, certain weapon finishes have attained famous status within the community.

- **AWP|Dragon Lore:** The holy grail of CS: GO skins. Sporting a legendary dragon motif, beautiful Factory New variations have actually historically cost tens of thousands of dollars.
- **AK-47|Case Hardened (Blue Gem):** Due to the method the case-hardened pattern rolls, rare variations include almost completely solid blue topsides, fetching astronomical collector costs.
- **M4A4|Growl:** The only skin categorized as "Contraband." Valve eliminated it from drop swimming pools due to copyright infringement issues involving the art work, making existing copies profoundly important collector's items.
- **Karambit|Doppler (Ruby/Sapphire/Emerald):** High-end knives including fantastic gem-like finishes that stay status signs among veteran players.

5. The Transition to Counter-Strike 2 (CS2)

When Valve transitioned the game from CS: GO to **Counter-Strike 2**, fans held their collective breath relating to the fate of their stocks. Luckily, Valve validated that **all products brought over flawlessly** into the brand-new engine.
