Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Repairing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is a simple repair, however a loose hinge needs a bit more attention.

1. **Find the concern:** Open and close the door gradually to pinpoint the bothersome hinge.
2. **Tighten up screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes have become stripped, get rid of the screws, place a little wood sliver (or a toothpick coated in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Oil:** If the door squeaks, apply a couple of drops of lightweight device oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Wipe away any excess.

2. Adjusting a Sticking Door

If a door rubs against the frame when closing, it is generally due to the fact that the top hinge is loose, causing the door to droop, or the wood has actually broadened.



1. **Inspect the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the leading and middle hinges.
2. **Use the longer screw trick:** If tightening doesn't work, change one short screw on the frame side of the top hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the whole door assembly back into positioning.

3. **Plane the edge:** If the door still sticks after adjusting the hinges, use a block aircraft or a sander to shave down a tiny fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

To extend the life expectancy of your doors and decrease the requirement for unanticipated repair work, follow these simple preventive maintenance actions two times a year:

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect exterior doors annually for fractures, tears, or compression. Change used strips to preserve home energy performance.
- **Keep Tracks Clean:** For moving glass doors and pocket doors, vacuum out dust, hair, and debris from the tracks regularly. Oil tracks with a silicone-based spray (avoid sticky lubricants like grease, which bring in dirt).
- **Examine Hardware:** Periodically examine doorknobs, handles, strikes plates, and deadbolts to ensure they are protected and functioning smoothly.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Since wood expands and contracts with wetness, maintaining a steady indoor humidity level utilizing cooling or dehumidifiers assists avoid wooden doors from contorting and sticking.

1. How do I know if my door requires to be repaired or completely replaced?

If the damage is purely cosmetic (minor scratches, loose hardware, little holes), a repair is adequate. Drafts generally occur due to compressed, harmed, or missing out on weatherstripping around the door frame, or a gap beneath the door. Setting up a new door sweep at the bottom and changing border weatherstripping generally fixes the issue.

4. Is it possible to repair a door that won't latch properly?

The majority of the time, a door that won't lock is merely struggling with misalignment in between the latch bolt and the strike plate. You can typically repair this by loosening the screws on the strike plate and shifting it a little up or down, or by submitting down the inside lip of the strike plate opening.
